Montpelier's location offers a firsthand opportunity to experience the South of France's rich Mediterranean history and culture in this class, which examines the ancient and modern legacies of colonialism, immigration, and assimilation. In-class lectures provide content and preparation, but the learning experience emphasizes walking tours and day trips to local ancient historic sites and museums, North African markets, and other nearby sites.

## **Course Description:**

**HIST 2991/4991: France and Mediterranean World** is an overview of South of France history and an introduction to public history theory, practices, and evolution as applied in the South of France. The course has two main aims:

- 1) To explore the South of France's historic and cultural connections to the Mediterranean Basin both historically and in the modern period.
- 2) The help students to develop the basic techniques of understanding the process of historical scholarship, and creating history. Emphasis will be placed on the use of public space for historical interpretation and celebration, as well as the role of religious, regional, and national identity in the urban landscape of Montpellier.
