HIST 2991a/4991a: Restaging the Past in the South of France Summer 2019, Glories of France

This course uses walking tours and day trips to examine the restaging and presentation of France's past through architecture and monuments. Montpellier, Paris, Arles, and Avignon include significant Gallic and Roman historic sites, Medieval and Baroque architecture and monuments, as well as museums and historic churches that reveal the depth of France's rich layered history in the urban landscape and the shaping of national identity.

HIST 2991/4991: Restaging the Past in the South of France is an overview of South of France history and an introduction to the practice of public history theory, practices, and evolution as applied in the South of France. The course has two main aims:

- 1) To acquaint students with the history of France, and an introduction to the study of public art and history, exhibit design, and museum development.
- 2) To help students to develop the basic techniques of historical scholarship, and analysis of public art and public history. Emphasis will be placed on learning and understanding questions used to examine public art and public historical sites, as well as exploring all facets of museum and exhibit design.
