About New Orleans

The vibrant culture of New Orleans offers our

students linguistic, literary, and cultural experiences found nowhere else in the country. The university is surrounded by the living history of a city that has inspired some of the greatest figures in American litera-



ture, including William Faulkner, Tennessee Williams, and Kate Chopin. New Orleans developed under the leadership of two powerful Romance cultures: France, which founded the settlement and gave the colony its original French character, and Spain, that transformed



it into a stately city and, as capital of the Spanish Province of Louisiana, gave it administration, laws, architecture, and prosperity. This character

was reinforced by the subsequent arrival of Acadians from Canada (Cajuns), Canary islanders (Los Isleños), refugees from Haiti, Sephardic Jews, Italians from Calabria and Sicily, and, more recently, nurtured by the constant influx of people from Latin America.

Learning about these cultural influences and experiencing them first-hand, will increase the student's appreciation of New Orleans as a melting pot of languages and cultures. The campus is a ten-minute drive from the historic French Quarter with its Old World atmosphere. The stately neighborhoods of the Garden District and oak-lined St. Charles Avenue, where streetcars pass, are also nearby. Throughout the year, the New Orleans met-

ropolitan area offers a rich assortment of cultural activities. The city is famous for its annual events like Mardi Gras, Jazz Fest,



Essence Festival, and the Words & Music Festival, as well as the many local and regional celebrations of Louisiana's culture and cuisine like the Oktoberfest, Japan Fest, the French Film Festival, and the Day of the Dead and Cinco de Mayo celebrations. Organizations like the Casa de España, Sociedad Española, Alliance Française, French Consulate, CODOFIL Consortium, Deutsche House, and Japan Society of New Orleans, coupled with our array of French and Spanish immersion schools, offer our language students a variety of exciting opportunities such classes, lectures, films, scholarships, internships, volunteering, and employment.

Meet the Faculty

The Division of Foreign Languages is part of the largest department on the UNO campus, the Department of Language and Literature. We are acclaimed literary and cultural scholars, critics, translators, and interpreters, and above all, we are accomplished teachers, dedicated to providing our students a Liberal Arts education of the highest quality. Student evaluations rate our teaching highly. The following are profiles of three of our faculty.





Dr. Olivier Bourderionnet is the Graduate Coordinator of Foreign Language Programs and Associate Professor of French who teaches courses on

contemporary French literature and culture, pop culture, and the cultural industries. His book Swing Troubadours: Vian, Brassens, Gainsbourg: les Trente Glorieuses en 33 tours (Summa Pub 2012) examines the transformation of post-WWII France through the prism of popular music and the impact of jazz on French chanson. Dr. Bourderionnet has also published numerous articles treating French popular music in the interwar period, and French Hip-hop culture. He is currently working on a volume dedicated to French musical films since the nineteen sixties as well as a coedited volume on Serge Gainsbourg with Olivier Julien from Sorbonne Université.



Dr. Lisbeth Philip is an Assistant Professor of Spanish, and also a sociolinguist who has published extensively in the US and abroad. She is a CCHI Certified Healthcare Interpreter[™] a Certified Court Interpreter in Spanish, and a Registered Interpreter in French on the Louisiana Supreme Court's registry of court interpreters. Dr. Philip teaches Spanish and French at the undergraduate and graduate levels, and has developed and taught courses in foreign languages teaching methodologies. She has done extensive work in Service Learning, and has participated in local public events as a volunteer interpreter in both the healthcare and legal settings.



Dr. Juliana Starr, is an Associate Professor of French and a member of the Women's Studies faculty. She was one of the Organizers-in-Chief of the International Conference on Émile Zola and Naturalism at UNO in March 2014, a conference that brought 100 participants from 15 countries. She has authored a number of reviews and articles, treating primarily representations of women in French literature of the 19th century. She is Editor in Chief of the Naturalist journal *Excavatio* and President of AIZEN, the International Association on Zola and Naturalism.



FRENCH 3002: Practical French Phonetics Phonetics (from the Greek word, phone = voice/sound) is the study of sounds used in speech. This online course covers the transcription of French discourse using the International Phonetic Alphabet; the terminology necessary for the study of French phonetics and the relationship between French spelling and pronunciation.

FRENCH 4202: French Civilization II:"The Outsiders"

An overview of French culture and civilization (history, fine arts, architecture, history of ideas, literature and popular culture) from the end of the Middle Ages to the Napoleonic wars. Students will study the evolution of French society throughout this period, follow the evolution of intellectual and cultural life, encounter key characters, and discuss artistic movements. Our approach will be thematic rather than chronological

centering on the character of the Outsider...



A Selection of Recent Course Offerings

FRENCH/SPAN 3406: Romance Cultures of New Orleans and Louisiana

Throughout the 18th century, colonial New Orleans developed under the leadership of two powerful Romance cultures: France, which initiated the settlement and gave the colony its original French character, and Spain, that transformed it into a stately city and, as capital of the Spanish Province of Louisiana, gave it administration, laws, architecture, and prosperity. This character was reinforced by the arrival of Acadians from Canada, Canary islanders, refugees from Haiti, Sephardic Jews, Italians from Calabria and Sicily ... and, more. Learning about these original cultural influences will frame New Orleans as a melting pot of Romance cultures.

FRENCH/SPAN 3405: Romance Literature and Film

This course is an introduction to film aesthetics through the screening of motion pictures created by Spanish and French film makers. Students will view, analyze and discuss thematic content of selected Spanish and French movies, to see how they depart from, magnify, or diminish the original literary narratives. The goals of the class are twofold: to

help students develop ease and fluency in discussing their opinions on the movies viewed, both in speaking and in writing, and to develop a greater appreciation of Spanish and French culture and literature through film.

SPAN 4015: History of the Spanish Language

Students will study the evolution of the Spanish language in the Iberian Peninsula and other Spanish-speaking countries. This class will explore the influences of other languages, such as Latin and Arabic, on the vocabulary, syntax, phonology and morphology of Spanish. We will also discuss the gradual development of modern Spanish, including varieties of Latin American Spanish and Spanish in the United States.

SPAN 3100: Survey of Spanish Literature I

Students read selections and / or complete works by representative writers from Medieval Spain (14th to 16th centuries). This course includes narrative forms, poetry, drama and essays with also an overview of the historical period in which each literary work was composed.





We welcome and encourage all students to take our courses! Students in the College of Liberal Arts, Education, and Human Development, or in the College of Sciences, will have a foreign language requirement. If you already have skills in a foreign language, you may want to consider the Languages Placement Test, which is free of charge and takes one hour. The advantage of the test is that you may finish your foreign language requirement sooner. Then you will be free to concentrate on other things.....or take another language!
