Ph.D. IN URBAN STUDIES PROGRAM



The **Doctor of Philosophy in Urban Studies** degree program is an interdisciplinary program within the College of Liberal Arts and Education that enables students of exceptional ability to undertake advanced study and original research. Students must complete 60 credit hours of coursework, including pre-doctoral graduate-level coursework, in three areas: the urban studies core, research design and methods, and the major area. Students choose from three major fields of study (27 hours): urban affairs, urban history, urban and regional planning, and transportation. In addition, students must complete nine credit hours of dissertation research. The program's mission is to prepare students for careers in scholarly activity, applied research, and policy analysis.

The Ph.D. in Urban Studies program provides graduates with a solid foundation for pursuing careers in academia or to engage in advanced policy analysis and applied research outside of academic settings. Upon successful completion of the program, students will have mastered the literature and theory in a particular area of scholarship as well as the research skills necessary to make significant and original contributions in their respective fields. Students enrolled in the program draw upon the expertise of faculty members working in the areas of anthropology, history, sociology, public administration, and planning, among others.

Ph.D. SUBFIELDS

Urban Affairs

The urban affairs subfield is interdisciplinary and focused on the study, policy analysis, and management of cities and metropolitan areas, aiming to solve complex issues like housing, sustainability, economic development, and social equity. Through theoretical, empirical, and action-oriented research, this subfield is dedicated to creating spaces for engaging in intellectual and practical discussions about urban life.

Urban History

The subfield in Urban History is offered in cooperation with the Department of History, Anthropology and Sociology. Students develop both a theoretical foundation and the practical skills related to the analysis and interpretation of data used in assessing impacts to historic structures and resources. The program provides a theoretical foundation for students who wish to continue their education in the fields of archaeology, anthropology, cultural heritage, and history, among other fields. Urban and Regional Planning

The subfield in Urban Planning is offered through the Division of Planning and Public Affairs. Students develop the requisite skills and knowledge to shape urban and regional planning in such areas as neighborhood revitalization, land use planning, economic development, transportation, disaster management and recovery, and housing and environmental planning. Planners actively seek to balance historic and cultural preservation. Transportation

The subfield in Transportation is offered through the Division of Planning and Public Affairs in conjunction with the University of New Orleans Transportation Institute. This subfield incorporates applied and scholarly research with education and outreach initiatives to support advancements in both passenger and freight transportation systems.
