HYPHENS

• **Hyphens connect word groups if they are used as adjectives.** Note the difference in examples below: the second sentence in each pair uses a hyphenated word group as an adjective.

Asher's car is not <u>up to date</u>. Asher needs to get an <u>up-to-date</u> car. Jacob will be <u>nine years old</u> this year. Mother brought her <u>twlve-year-old son</u> to the community pool. Jacob's father smacked him with a wooden spoon that was <u>three inches</u> long. Jacob's father smacked him with a <u>three-inch</u> wooden spoon.

Some compound words—such as notebook and looking glass—do not require hyphens. When in doubt, check the dictionary!

If an adverb ending in –ly precedes the noun, you do NOT use a hyphen. *Mother and Father are a happily married couple.*

- Hyphens are used for two-word numbers from *twenty-one* through *ninety-nine* and between the numerator and the denominator of two-word fractions (*one-half, two-fifths*)
- Hyphens join prefixes all-, ex-, and self-), suffixes (-elect), and letters to a word. Ever since Asher got a job at the mechanic's shop, he has been <u>self-</u>supporting. Mother's <u>ex-</u>husband professed his <u>all-</u>encompassing hatred for Mother's new lover. The PTA president-<u>elect</u> made a strong impression on Mother. Jacob wore a neon-green <u>T</u>-shirt.
- Prefixes such as *anti-*, *non-*, *pro-*, *and co-* do not normally require a hyphen unless you want to prevent misreading (*co-op* is not the same as *coop*) or a double or triple letter (*anti-itch*, *bell-like*). When in doubt about whether to use a hyphen or not, consult the dictionary! *Father always has to sit in the <u>nonsmoking</u> section of the restaurant. Asher got tired of Mother's antifamily behavior and told her to leave the house.*
- **Hyphens avoid ambiguity in certain words.** *Playing baseball with his friends is Jacob's favorite <u>recreation</u>. <i>Mother's latkes were praised for their strong re-creation of authentic deli cuisine.*
- Hyphenate the written form of fractions and of compound numbers from twenty-one to ninety-nine. Asher bequeathed <u>one-third</u> of his baseball cards to Jacob. He felt that the first <u>twenty-five</u> cards, though, would be his own choice.
